Guidance Plan Told Educators

Miss Margaret R. Miner, dean of girls, Charlotte High School, Rochester, was reelected president of the New York State Association of Deans and Other Guidance Personnel this morning at a business session of the threeday conference held in the Mark Twain Hotel ballroom. She will -serve a two-year term.

The development of a system of student educational case histories over a 10-year period was described by Dr. Anna L. Rose Hawkes, field director of the Pennsylvania Study following the business session. She pointed out that "since the growth of the individual pupil in knowledge and in wisdom is the core of the educational process, the student is more important than the curriculum."

From teacher's comments, test records, answers to questionaires, reading lists, personal inventories, vast amounts of material pertaining to the individual student have been assembled in an attempt to aid the student toward adjustment and capacity development.

She said that the educational case history differs from the medical history in that it deals with perfectly normal as well as abnormal people-and that the "patient" is never dismissed after diagnosis and treatment.


