Renaming of parts of N. and S. Main St. and Park Pl. as Mark Twain Blvd. or Mark Twain Way will be discussed at Monday night's City Council meeting.

The proposal has been made in a letter to Mayor Emory Strachen from the Southside Business Organization, written by Lyman A. White, SBO president.

The SBO's request calls for S. Main St. from Pennsylvania Ave. to the Main St. Bridge to be known as S. Mark Twain Way or Blvd.

N. Main St., as far as W. Third St., and Park Pl., as far as Washington Ave., would be known as N. Mark Twain Way or Blvd.

Some months ago the SBO proposed that S. Main St.'s name be changed to honor Mark Twain and the request was referred to City Manager Robert E. Quin a recommendation. Since other suggestions have come for more of Main St. to be included should there be a namechanging program.






